Subject: Local Elections – Polling Place Update

I am pleased to report that, overall, the November general election held at Milford High School went very well. With the support of more than 125 volunteers, town clerk Joan Dargie and her staff, my assistant moderators, the Supervisors of the Checklist, the Board of Selectmen and town administration, the police, fire and DPW, and School District personnel, more than 9,250 citizens safely cast their ballots, whether in person or by an absentee ballot.

Looking ahead to the March 9th town and school district elections, I am making minor changes to the voting process:

Location

The School Board has approved our use of the High School instead of the Middle School. Students will not be in class on Election Day.

Entrance

All voters will enter Milford High School by the main entrance on West St. Voters who are wearing a face mask or face covering will be allowed into the school. Voters who cannot or choose not to wear a face mask or covering will be directed to a tent set up adjacent to *Windows on West Street*. A greeter will be present to facilitate the process.

ePoll Books

The ePoll books will be set up along the right lobby wall. Voters will check-in, receive a personalized printed slip, and head to the gym to receive and cast their ballots.

New Voters

Given so many new voters registered in the fall, I believe we will register about 50 new voters on Election Day. The Supervisors of the Checklist will register new voters along the left wall of the lobby, including some of the space in the hallway that goes to the cafeteria. We will not use the HS cafeteria for any part of the election.

Tent for Unmasked Voters

Everyone inside the polling place must wear a face mask or covering. We will have a tent considered "within the rail" and, therefore, a part of the polling place for voters who cannot or choose not to wear a face mask or covering.

As in November, the tent will be between the main lobby entrance and the *Windows on West St.* restaurant. This location means voters with mobility difficulties may exit the gym by the right corner door, leading to the accessible parking spaces on West St.

We will be using the MFD's tent. The tent has sides and will have lights and a propane heater, while mats will cover the grass/snow.

Observers

Space will be set aside in the lobby and gym for the public to observe the election process.

Golf Carts

I will arrange for a golf cart with a masked driver for masked riders to use.

Communication

MPD will be using its portable electronic signs to remind voters of the polling place location. The signs will alert drivers to possible Election Day delays on West St. and Osgood Rd. Nixle event alerts will remind voters of the polling place and potential traffic delays.

We will also have signs on the Oval, notices on the town and school district websites, and social media postings.

Election Workers

We will have plenty of workers, given we now have more than 125 volunteers and will need about 25 per shift.

Closing

The steps described above are not chiseled in granite. Refinements will occur right up to the day before the election.

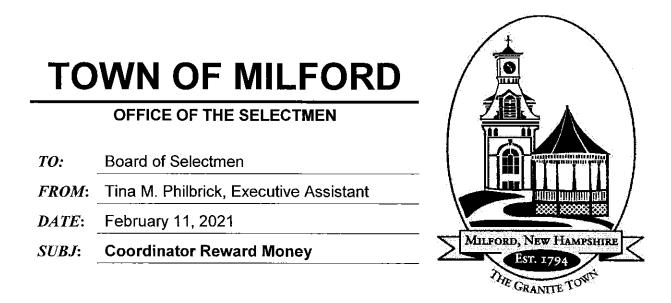

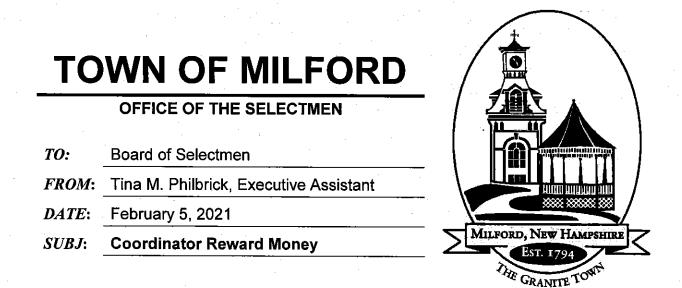

Selectman Dudziak moved to reconsider her vote on the DPW Vehicles and Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve. The vote is
 now 0/5 with no one supporting it.

83 TOWN FACILITIES RENOVATION AND MAJOR REPAIR REPLACEMENT CAPITAL RESERVE

84 Selectman Dudziak moved to reconsider her vote on Town Facilities Renovation and Major Repair Replacement capital 85 reserve warrant article. The vote is now 0/5 with no one supporting it.

Chairman Daniels moved to take DPW Vehicles and Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve off the warrant. Seconded
by Selectman Dudziak. A roll call vote was taken with Selectman Dargie yes, Selectman Dudziak yes, Selectman Laborte yes, Selectman Freel yes, and Chairman Daniels yes. All were in favor. The motion passed 5/0.

Chairman Daniels moved to take the Town Facilities Renovation and Major Repair Replacement Capital Reserve
off the warrant. Seconded by Selectman Dudziak. A roll call vote was taken with Selectman Dargie yes, Selectman
Dudziak yes, Selectman Labonte yes, Selectman Freel yes and Chairman Daniels yes. All were in favor. The motion
passed 5/0.

96 Selectman Freel asked for more information about the Keyes Park Expansion Committee Project Capital Reserve. Select-97 man Dargie gave an overview of the project. Currently, there is a \$59,000 study looking into a long term plan for Recrea-98 tion in Milford at Keyes field. The project has been delayed. The account will have zero dollars in it once the study is 99 complete. They have outdoor exercise equipment that needs to be installed and a walking path needs to be put in next to the 100 river and they need additional money to do this.

102 Chairman Daniels opposes this because even with the delays with COVID, the project can move forward with the study. He 103 doesn't feel more money is needed at this time. Selectman Dargie said Milford traditionally short changes non-emergency 104 functions like the Library and Recreation. Adding \$25,000 to recreation is a modest amount to contribute to an area that 105 traditionally hasn't received much. Selectman Labonte asked if DPW could help with some of the projects. Administrator 106 Shannon will check with Recreation and DPW.

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Selectman Freel moved to reconsider his vote on the Keyes Park Expansion Committee Project Capital Reserve warrant article. The vote is now 2/3.

111Fire Rescue Truck Replacement - 7-Year Lease/Purchase - \$689,700 (Annual Lease Payment \$86,214: \$100,000112Paid from Fire Apparatus Replacement Capital Reserve the Total Purchase Price (\$689,700)

Two versions of this warrant article were presented. The original one using \$100,000 from the Fire Apparatus Replacement Capital Reserve and requiring a 60% affirmative vote to pass and the other one not using any monies from the capital reserve account and only requiring a 50% majority vote to pass.

serve account and only requiring a 50% majority vote to 116

Selectman Dargie is in favor of language that doesn't use capital reserve and only requires a majority vote to pass. He has concerns about this article not passing. Selectman Freel fees we should be using the capital reserves for the purpose that

they were established although he does agree with the majority vote instead of 60%. Selectman Dargie said several vehicles in the last eight years passed between 50% and 60% but would not have passed if they required a 60% vote.

Paul Calabria, Finance Director said according to DRA, although we would need a 3/5 majority to withdraw from the capital reserve account, we could go with the majority option and then use the capital reserve monies to pay off the last year of the lease. The problem with that is that you have to make sure there is money in the capital reserve account to do this. You will still be paying interest on the ladder truck for the first 6 years and interest rates are still low at this time. If the town continues to support the capital reserve program, we can use it for the final year's payment.

127 Chairman Daniels questions the language of "raise and appropriate \$100,000 from the Fire Apparatus Replacement Capital 128 Reserve Fund as a down payment to reduce the lease/purchase price" he said we already raised and appropriated that mon-129 ey. Paul said it's the language that the DRA recommends to withdraw money from the capital reserve account. Chairman 130 Daniels still thinks it's wrong. Paul said it's written that way because we are appropriating the money from the trust funds.

Selectman Freel feels that you are saving this money for several years you should be using that money. Why can you just take the money out in the 2nd year instead of waiting until the 7th year? Paul said we have to commit the town to long term debt with this article with 60%. If we go with the majority only, you can't use your capital reserves until you know you are going to own the vehicle.

Selectman Dargie wants to have a warrant article next year to zero out that capital reserve and return the money to the taxpayers. He would just like to do a normal warrant article and fund 100% of the purchase price. Using the capital reserve makes it a 60% vote and it's risky. Selectman Freel said the Budget Advisory Committee is for capital reserve accounts.

Selectman Labonte is in favor of capital reserve accounts. He feels that going for a 60% vote means that you have proven your need. He feels that a 51% vote isn't adequate on long term debt. Not utilizing capital reserve puts more of a burden on the tax-payers by increasing their lease payments every year by increasing the interest. By using capital reserve on year seven he feels that you have now paid interest on that capital of \$100,000 for six years. Getting rid of interest is a way to save money. If this warrant article goes on without the capital reserve language in it, he won't vote for it.

Paul said that Selectman Dargie pointed out that there is a fatal flaw with the majority vote and using capital reserves. The voters vote depending on how their circumstances are, no matter how much we educate them. He would be in favor of doing it with the capital reserve because of the fatal flaw and how those laws are written. Language is being presented to change this language, but it hasn't happened yet. Until it's changed, we should either use the capital reserve for the last year's payment or do away with them and return them to the tax-payers. Selectman Labonte still doesn't agree with it.

153 Chairman Daniels suggests that someone bring in language at the next meeting for using capital reserve as the year's pay-154 ment on the ladder truck. Selectman Dargie said that language has already been provided in the document that they have in 155 front of them, it's written in purple. He is in favor of using the purple language version for all three articles.

Selectman Dargie made a motion to use the language that changes the warrant article for the fire rescue warrant article to a majority vote only. Seconded by Selectman Dudziak.

Selectman Freel is still leaning towards using the capital reserve for this warrant. Chief Flaherty, Fire Department, said he's in favor of whatever the Board will support 5/0 because historically a 5/0 vote is what the tax-payers make their decisions on. Having a split vote may cause the warrant article to fail.

Paul said because there was no action taken by the Board to buy some vehicles out of surplus knowing that we need vehicle replacement, he favors the 50% option and using the capital reserve for the final payment. Selectman Laborte repeated that he won't support the truck without the capital reserve language.

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Administrator Shannon asked the Fire Chief what would happen if he doesn't get this truck this year. Captain Flaherty said they would have to delay purchasing other apparatus later on. We are also trying to reduce manpower by putting two trucks into one. We are up for an ISO audit this year and not having the truck could adversely affect our rating.

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Selectman Freel clarified that using the capital reserve six years from now can't be written into the warrant article this year.
Paul said yes. Selectman Freel repeated that he still wants to see the capital reserve money used for this warrant this year.

Paul said yes. SelectmanChairman Daniels agreed.

A roll call vote was taken with Selectman Dargie yes, Selectman Dudziak yes, Selectman Labonte no, Selectman
Freel no and Chairman Daniels no. The motion failed 2/3 with Selectman Daniels, Selectman Labonte and Selectman Freel opposed. The language will not be changed.

Selectman Dargie asked to skip over the Public Works Snow Plow Unit Warrant article because it's basically the same discussion.

182 PUBLIC WORKS WHEEL BUCKET LOADER PURCHASE

Selectman Dargie explained that the original warrant article requires a 60% vote and uses a capital reserve and is a threeyear lease purchase. The second warrant article referenced (in purple) authorizes the purchase of the loader we are currently leasing and we get credit for this winter's payment towards the purchase. This uses the capital reserve account of \$120,000 as a one-time payment and the balance is also just a one-time payment, not a three-year lease purchase, and would only need a 50% vote. Overall, we are buying the existing one with a discount of \$19,000. The balance of the \$7,118 would be from the current year's expenditure.

Selectman Dargie made a motion to change the Public Works Wheel bucket Loader warrant article with alternate language to reflect a 50% majority vote. Seconded by Selectman Dudziak.

Selectman Laborte referenced the purchase policy and asked if we could do this with a single point purchase. The purchase policy states that we have to have three quotes. Administrator Shannon said the unit they are currently leasing is a Hitachi, that's why it's specified. Selectman Laborte asked if the town can spend \$146,000 by getting a single quote. Selectman Dargie said we can always override the existing three quote policy. Sole sourcing does exist. Administrator Shannon said he would clarify that information and get it to the Board for next Monday's meeting.

200 Selectman Dargie said it makes it easier for Tina if we are in a position we think we might end up in. She needs to post 201 these articles Monday night after changes are made after the meeting. Administrator Shannon asked if it could be passed on 202 the contingency that it's legal within the town's policy to not have three quotes in this one instance.

Selectman Laborte said it would be contingent on if it's the same Hitachi loader even in the red warrant article wording.
The \$19,000 would still be eligible to come off that warrant article providing that it's that vendor.

Selectman Freel needed more clarification on what we are looking to do with this warrant article. Paul said that Director Riendeau came to him with this alternative language which was reviewed with the DRA. The purchase price is \$146,000. We are looking to withdraw the entire \$120,000 from the capital reserve account, we are getting credit for the \$19,000 from Chappell Tractor, some of which we've already used this year, and the remaining \$7,118 is coming from taxation. In the red writing, we were only using \$80,000 from the capital reserve account and we were going to enter into a lease for the remaining \$60,000. It requires a 60% vote. Using the second option there will be no lease or interest needed and it's a onetime small payment. Selectman Freel said he would be in favor of the second option.

Selectman Labonte asked if the \$7,118 was an addition to the budget. Paul said yes. Selectman Labonte asked how old the loader was. He's assuming it isn't new. Selectman Freel said if it's coming from Chappell's, they wouldn't be charging more than it's worth. Chris Anton, DPW Highway Manager, said it's a new loader, last year's model. The total purchase price is \$165,000 minus dealer and manufacturer's discount brought it down to \$146,118 minus the \$19,000 rental agreement which brings it down to the \$127,118 purchase price. We were able to get the vehicle through the generosity of Chappell's.

Selectman Laborte still favors the warrant article in red at the 60% vote and only using \$80,000 from the capital reserve
 account.

A roll call vote was taken with Selectman Dargie yes, Selectman Dudziak yes, Selectman Labonte no, Selectman Freel yes and Chairman Daniels no. The motion passed 3/2 with Selectman Daniels and Selectman Labonte opposed.

229 Selectman Dargie asked to re-vote on recommending this article due to the language change.

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Selectman Dargie made a motion to recommend the Public Works Wheel bucket Loader warrant article using
 \$120,000 from the capital reserve account. Seconded by Selectman Dudziak.

Selectman Freel asked if this uses all the capital reserve from this account. Chairman Daniels said yes. He voted against the new language because he is confused about some of the language. Selectman Laboute said this has now increased DPW's budget by \$17,000 and has allowed the \$19,000 to be spent elsewhere from the rental. One could say you were now more than \$12,000 up on the budget. Selectman Freel said he didn't see it that way.

Paul said the Town Administrator can have this discussion with Director Riendeau and that should this warrant article pass as is, we would ask him not to spend those funds. Selectman Dargie said that isn't how he reads it. He interprets this as we would still spend the \$19,000 and it gets counted towards the purchase. It still comes out of the regular town budget, it's still being spent. Selectman Freel agreed; we were renting it regardless.

Selectman Dargie said on the first warrant article the payment was \$22,980 and that payment is being replaced by \$7,118 so the payment is going down, he is questioning the estimated tax impact. Chairman Daniels said the cash that is being used is \$26,118 which is \$7,118 plus the rental amount of \$19,000. At this point, there was major confusion and interpretation from several Board members.

Selectman Laborte presumes that the rental started in 2020. Chris said yes, two months payment was in 2020, moving forward will be three months of payment in the 2021 budget. The \$7,118 that they are talking about isn't in addition to the budget; it will be absorbed through the DPW budget they are not asking to increase the budget.

253 Selectman Laborte said you already made two payments for the lease in 2020 and there will be three more payments in 2021. Are you saying that the remainder of the rental money is where you are going to come up with the additional 254 255 \$7,118? Chris said there are multiple areas where it can be pulled from; he isn't saying he will directly take it out of the line 256 item Selectman Laborte is referring to. Out of a \$3,000,000 budget, they should be able to find \$7,118 to off-set this purchase and pay cash for it. Chris said they could use the funds that are leftover and apply them to this so that it's zero out. 257 258 Selectman Laborte said if we are not going to rent it anymore we should remove the rental amount from the budget moving 259 forward. Paul said the warrant article for the budget goes in after Deliberative and we can't reduce it and make it contin-260 gent on the passing of the bucket loader article.

Selectman Freel said you are going to rent the loader regardless, if the tax-payers vote yes Chappell's is going to take the
 rental price off the purchase price of the loader, he doesn't see the negative on that.

Chris tried to simplify this for the Board: If you have \$19,000, three months payments will cost \$11,400, we have enough room to pay the difference and that would zero it out for the 2021 budget season. Selectman Laborte said it's an increase in DPW's budget of \$7,118. Chris repeated, they are not asking to increase the budget by \$7,118.

Chairman Daniels clarified that the \$7,118 would be found within DPW's \$3,000,000 budget. Chris said yes it would be found within the 2021 budget, they are not asking for an increase. Selectman Laborte said if you are buying the rental we should be reducing the rental for 2021. Chris said that their equipment rental is not solely for this operation. Other equipment is rented throughout the year that is also including in this.

Chairman Daniels said the language in the warrant article is misleading. The language implies that we are using \$19,000 to reduce the price. Selectman Laborte wants to reduce the 2021 rental amount for DPW. Chris said if it's reduced now and the loader fails, you have no money for rental cost needed for the winter of 2021. Selectman Laborte agreed.

Selectman Freel said the idea is to use an additional \$40,000 of the capital reserve and try to get this done in one year instead of a three-year lease program. He doesn't understand why it's this hard to understand. Does all this information have to be included in the warrant? Paul said yes it does. Selectman Freel is still for the warrant article.

Selectman Laborte wants to know what clarification we are waiting for on Monday. Selectman Freel said that DPW won't
 spend that money in their budget. Selectman Laborte also wants clarification on the purchase policy for sole source. Administrator Shannon repeated that he will get that for the Board.

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Chairman Daniels said he isn't sure he's in favor of eliminating competition in the bidding. He asked if there was a reason that Hitachi needs to be there. Selectman Labonte said yes, it's the only way you will get the \$19,000 back. If you put it out to bid and someone else came in cheaper than \$19,000 than Hitachi that would be the only way this would be advantageous. Chris repeated there are two factors; the generous discount that was extended by the Chappell family combined with the municipal discount will not be matched by another vendor. The second is that the \$19,000 is also the generous donation from the Chappell family to be 100% applied which will also not be able to be applied by another other vendors. He will get as many quotes as you want, but they will not be lower than this one.

Selectman Freel agrees with Chris Anton, it sounds like a very good deal, and knowing the Chappell family he doesn't think that they would ever take advantage of this town. Chairman Daniels said they will have Administrator Shannon check on the purchase policy to make sure there are no problems in going this way.

Selectman Dargie thinks it would be okay to remove the word Hitachi from the warrant article so if you wanted to go get quotes you could. Selectman Laborte said the problem with that is that the \$19,000 wouldn't apply because it only applies to the Hitachi. Chris said that is correct. Selectman Dargie said we will get the same quote from them whether the word Hitachi is in the warrant article or not.

Administrator Shannon said section VIII letter A in the procurement policy reads: <u>Sole Source Proposals</u>: The Town of Milford will not entertain the solicitation of a single-source vendor for supplies and/or services unless the competitive bid requirements are explicitly waived by a vote of the Board of Selectmen.

Selectman Laborte isn't opposed to the loader. If someone were to take a stance on staying with the 60% vote, wouldn't it be uniformed to stay with the original language? What is the difference from a Finance point of view? Paul said it's just in the majority needed to pass the article. Both are using capital reserve but the second one buys the vehicle this year so we don't need the 60% because we are not leasing it over three years.

Selectman Laborte questioned the tax impact being lower on the original warrant article. Paul said the lease amount is lower. Tina Philbrick, Milford resident, asked how much interest we would have to pay back on the first warrant article with the three-year lease. Paul said they are projecting about 2% for a total of less than \$5,000 over three years.

Selectman Laborte is staying with the first option with the 60% vote. You are saving 18 cents by going with the 60% vote option. Selectman Dargie said only in the first year, you still have a tax impact over the next two lease payment years.

A roll call vote was taken with Selectman Dargie yes, Selectman Dudziak yes, Selectman Labonte no, Selectman Freel yes, and Chairman Daniels yes. The motion passed 4/1. Selectman Dargie will do a majority report and Selectman Labonte will do a minority report if needed.

Kathy Parenti, Library Trustee Chair, said there was confusion about the Library warrant article. Their estimate comes in at \$1,200,000 and we are only asking the town for \$995,000. Do we need to indicate that the Trustees will cover anything above that or can we leave it as it is? Paul said the DRA said they can amend the warrant article at the Deliberative session because the net is not changing. The municipal budget act requires that all appropriations are shown in a gross state. You would have to show the \$1,200,000 and the expenditure from the trust fund of \$205,000 to get down to the \$995,000 net amount that you are asking the tax-payers to bond. He is working with DRA on the language.

63 Selectman Dargie made a motion to authorize the Conservation Commission to purchase Map 52 Lot 4-1. Seconded 64 by Selectman Dudziak.

66 Chairman Daniels asked how much land in the town is currently in conservation. Andy said about 1,100 acres and the town 67 is around 15,000 acres, around 7 % to 8%. Chairman Daniels asked if there was a cap on how much of the town should be 68 conservation land. Andy said it varies but he doesn't know. Chris said she thinks it's around 30% that should be protected. 69 Some of the land that is in conservation is protected in one form or another like an easement. Some are owned by the land-69 owner not the town and they pay taxes on it because it's still in current use.

A Roll Call vote was taken with Selectman Dargie yes, Selectman Dudziak yes, Selectman Labonte yes, Selectman Freel yes, and Chairman Daniels yes. All were in favor. The motion passed 5/0.

5:50 p.m. – BROX Community Land Conservation Easement – Conservation Chair, Andy Hughes and Conservation Member, Chris Costantino.

Selectman Dudziak made a motion to take the BROX Community Land Conservation Easement off the table. Seconded by Selectman Dargie. A Roll Call vote was taken with Selectman Dargie yes, Selectman Dudziak yes, Selectman Laborte yes, Selectman Freel yes, and Chairman Daniels yes. All were in favor. The motion passed 5/0.

In summary: In summary: An Alteration of Terrain Updated Permit (dated 10/26/20) was submitted by the Town for the sand and gravel operation on the property referred to as the Brox Community Land. One of the conditions of this permit is that the Town of Milford (Town) will put 75 +/-acres into a conservation easement (Plan sheet 1 of 9 note #11). The Board of Selectmen, at their October 14, 2019 meeting, accepted the Milford Conservation Commission's (MCC) offer to facilitate this easement process. The Conservation Commission is suggesting that the Board include the remaining cost of \$30,000 in their 2021 budget.

Andy said NH Fish and Game is waiting for the permit to be reissued. Chairman Daniels asked the Town Administrator if he had an update. Administrator Shannon said the easement isn't in the contract. Administrator Shannon said we are meeting with NH Fish and Game next week to get more information. Our 30-day extension is up on February 19th. DES is waiting on Fish and Game.

94 Selectman Laborte asked if this becomes a cost of the permit, it wasn't supposed to cost anything. The easement is a condi-95 tion of the permit; you can't get the permit without the easement. Administrator Shannon said the language in the contract 96 didn't cover easements.

98 Selectman Dargie suggested working out a trade with the contractor where they would pay for the easement in return for 99 materials from the gravel operation. Administrator Shannon said they haven't brought that up to the contractor yet. 100

Selectman Laborte read some of the contract, and he feels that easements would be part of the contractor's responsibility.
 Administrator Shannon said the contractor paid for the permit for \$18,000 but he repeated, the contract doesn't mention
 easements.

Selectman Laborte repeated, you can't get the easement without the permit. Chris said the old permit was issued before the easement was completed; it has to be done at some point. Chairman Daniels asked if the AoT is approved do we do the easement right after. Administrator Shannon said that is his understanding.

Lincoln Daley, Community Development Director said the easement was negotiated as part of the initial permit. There will
 be new discussions as part of the new permit.

Selectman Freel said he is for just getting this done, pay for it, and be done. We are not selling anything unless we get this done.

Selectman Freel made a motion to spend the \$30,000 for the easement conditional upon approval of the AoT permit. Seconded by Selectman Dargie.

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DRAFT MINUTES OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN MEETING - 2/08/2021

Selectman Laborte asked where the \$30,000 would come from. Selectman Freel said from the sale of the gravel. Selectman Laborte asked for it to be reviewed by the town Counsel to see if the expense falls under the contractor. There was some conversation as to if the contract was still active, and it was determined that it is.

Selectman Dargie asked if the revenue from selling the gravel be unanticipated, which we can spend, or anticipated revenue, which we can't spend so the \$30,000 would have to come out of the budget. Paul Calabria, Finance Director said we put \$10 in as a placeholder for revenue for the gravel operation so it would be anticipated revenue.

Selectman Dargie asked Paul if he thought they could find \$30,000 in the budget for this. Paul said he is uncertain at this time. Administrator Shannon mentioned two positions that are not filled yet, maybe some of the money can come from those. Paul said he doesn't want to commit to anything at this point.

Selectman Freel said if we get the AoT permit and easement we will make \$30,000 back within this current year. He would like to add an amendment to his motion to make sure that the contractor doesn't have to pay for the easement and then we can move forward.

Selectman Laborte wants to table this and check with legal counsel first. Selectman Freel said we keep talking about the same thing over and over, it would be nice to move on. Selectman Laborte said it's the state that is holding this up, not us. Chairman Daniels asked if the \$30,000 had to be paid all at once or could it be done in payments. Chris said Fish and Game didn't give them that answer. It was her job to let the Board know that this expense was coming.

Chairman Daniels asked if money could be taken out of the fund balance. Paul said no. If money comes in, it would go into the general account under the gravel account. There is currently \$10 in that account as a place holder. It lapses each year. We received \$135,128, we budgeted \$150,000 that year. We received nothing in 2020. Selectman Laborte said we paid for sand in October. Administrator Shannon said we got about ½ a days' worth of sand from the pit and then someone called DES about the sand that had already been screened to prepare for winter and they told us we could take anymore because the AoT permit wasn't good.

Chairman Daniels asked how long before we can get this going again. Administrator Shannon said we should know by the 19th if we are approved or not. He doesn't know how long it will take North East to get up and running. The surveying will still need to be done before everything is finalized.

Selectman Laborte said in 2019 we made \$135,000 and budgeted for \$150,000. The purpose for the money coming in was to be a revenue source to offset taxes. This is still pulling \$30,000 out of revenue and costing the tax-payers something. Selectman Freel said from what he knows, the easement will not be paid by the contractor. It has to be done by the people who own the land. Their contract covers permits, that's it.

155 Lincoln unfortunately there were unanticipated costs that arose as part of the warrant article that was approved by the town, one being the easement and two being the legal cost to defend the AoT permit to the state. Selectman Laborte asked at 156 157 what point do we keep sinking money into this when we are not getting much gain out of it. Lincoln said because of the 158 wording of the permit and the delays caused by the state, this caused delays in the overall project. Had there not been de-159 lays, the town would have seen more revenue. The 75 acres of the easement was part of the on-going discussions with NH 160 Fish and Game and DES as part of the initial AoT permit. This was unanticipated to us, it was offered as part of offsite 161 mitigation for the overall project. Unfortunately, there is a cost associated with it which we were not initially aware of. Had 162 the permit not been delayed or voided, the town would have been in a bigger and better position. The town has since re-163 submitted the application to the state and the goal is to capture the revenue like was initially approved.

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Selectman Laborte said he met with the contractor previously and he was told that because they hit hard till it would cut them back quite a bit on expected yardage. He asked if anyone had the projected loss from that. Lincoln said he hadn't verified that discussion or the possible loss. He will follow-up with the contractor. Administrator Shannon said nothing was mentioned to him about this.

Selectman Freel asked how long the permits were good for. Lincoln said initially it was a three to five-year time frame. This new permit should cover the same amount of time. Selectman Freel asked if the permit needs to be renewed each year. Lincoln said no, it's not an annual fee; the permit covers the time frame for the permit. Selectman Freel said after everything is done, you are talking over \$375,000 to \$500,000 in revenue, he feels that \$30,000 is worth it.

DRAFT MINUTES OF BOARD OF SELECTMEN MEETING - 2/08/2021

Chairman Daniels said if we go forward with the motion, where does the \$30,000 come from. We can't take it out of the fund balance and we have nothing in the gravel account. Selectman Freel asked if we could take it from a larger section of the budget and then pay it back when the money comes in. Selectman Laborte said if we end up with a default budget, where would the money come from then. There was more discussion about where the money could come from, when the operation will start up again, etc.

181 Selectman Dargie said because there is ten dollars in that account, the money coming in is anticipated and you can't just 182 add it to the budget. Selectman Laborte said no one expected a year delay in this. Selectman Dargie said he would be okay 183 paying the \$30,000; his only concern is if we get a default budget. He's in favor of moving ahead.

Paul asked if the \$30,000 could be paid for out of Conservation knowing that they would receive the funds back. Andy said the Commission would have to discuss, it's not a cast-iron guaranty that it's coming back. Selectman Freel said we should have thought of this when we were talking about the money returned from the CARES act. Selectman Freel asked if Administrator Shannon could ask North East Sand and Gravel how long it would take to receive \$30,000 in revenue just in case Conservation decided to help out. Selectman Dargie said he doesn't think they will be allowed to use the money from this to reimburse Conservation.

Selectman Freel asked if it was possible to build up another account after the gravel is sold to use for things like this. Paul said they could set up a capital reserve fund. They would have to pick an amount each year to put in a non-lapsing fund and it would have to be done through a warrant.

Seconded by Selectman Dargie. A Roll Call vote was taken with Selectman Dargie yes, Selectman Dudziak yes, Selectman Labonte no, Selectman Freel yes and Chairman Daniels yes. The motion passed 4/1 with Selectman Labonte opposed.

- PUBLIC COMMENTS (regarding items that are not on the agenda) Chairman Daniels said the BSA Scout Troop 4 has been permitted to meet again. We previously permitted them to use the banquet hall for meetings and then we closed the town hall down. Meetings are critical as there is only so much time to finish an Eagle Scout project. Administrator Shannon said it was already approved previously so it doesn't need Board approval again. The meetings are from 7pm to 9pm twice a month and we feel it can be done as long as they follow the COVID protocols.
- Selectman Dargie asked if anyone else besides the scouts could meet. Administrator Shannon said the Board only
 permitted the scouts. Recreation is looking to start some small programs back up sometime in February. Chairman
 Daniels is fine with the Town Administrator working with his staff to do what is necessary to keep things safe.

She will review the proof tomorrow and authorize it to go to print. The town's portion of the voter's guide is complete and she is just waiting for the school's section. The whole guide will be sent to the printers this week.

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Chairman Daniels asked if it will be sent out by household. Tina said yes, one copy to each household. Selectman Labonte
asked if there will be extra copies available at the town hall. Tina said yes. Selectman Dargie asked if it was every household or every registered voter. Tina said every household; to separate it would be too much.

246 2. Recycling Update – Town Administrator, John Shannon

The transfer station is currently taking aluminum, steel, and tin cans, glass bottles, and glass jars only (no caps or covers please), corrugated cardboard, and clean mixed paper and magazines. We will begin taking plastics again in February. We have hoppers outside the recycling center where residents can separate cans and bottles with plastics to be added. Additional information will be posted on the Town website when it becomes available.

Chairman Daniels asked if the process in the Transfer Station will change from what it previously was. Administrator Shannon said just a little. Selectman Dargie asked what the recommendation from the Transfer Station supervisor as to when you should start doing this. Administrator Shannon said April, but we are changing the process to get it done safely and earlier. Selectman Dargie presumes there will be sorting, plastic is different because the pieces go into different containers. From a safety perspective, it's worse than the other recyclables.

273 Administrator Shannon said he spoke to the Town Administrator in Wilton and he knows where we stand. There have been 274 discussions at his level. Chairman Daniels asked the Board if they would rather wait until after the election before respond-275 ing to the other towns. Selectman Dargie and Selectman Dudziak said yes. Selectman Freel said he could go either way. 276 Selectman Laborte said CTA already gave a presentation to the BOG of MACC Base. Chairman Daniels said that isn't the 277 only consideration. Chairman Daniels repeated as in the past, one of the major benefits to anyone coming on as a customer 278 would be that each of their emergency services will have a representative on the operations and the finance committee. We 279 haven't talked about how those will be structured. There is a lot of work to be done before we go out and have a random 280 talk. 281

Selectman Labonte said if this being presented to the tax-payers that this is going to be a benefit, he feels it should be ironed out before voting. Administrator Shannon said all the towns are aware that this is a warrant and what we are doing. No one is unclear about what is going on. It's better to wait to see what course we are taking. There is no value-added with all the Boards getting together now when we don't have a final plan. Selectman Labonte just wanted to see if the other town had any interest in joining us. Chairman Daniels said it can wait until after the vote.

Selectman Freel asked about going back to a hybrid meeting. Chairman Daniels said it's a possibility. If you have a majority of the Board at the town hall location, the doors have to be open to the public.
