Gary Birkett, for property located at 155 Foster Road, Milford, NH, Tax Map 56, Lot 44-3, in the Residential R district, is seeking a Special Exception of the Milford Zoning Ordinances per Article X, Section 10.02.3 to allow a Home Occupation for the sale of firearms in a single family residence.

APPROVED March 1, 2018

Steve Bonczar, Chair, opened the meeting and introduced the Board members. He informed all of the procedures of the Board. Since there was a full agenda, he stated the Board's rules allowed for adjournment at 10 p.m. Any cases not completed or heard would be continued or tabled to the next regularly scheduled meeting with no additional notice to applicants or abutters. One regular Board member being absent, it was moved by S. Bonczar to seat Tracy Steel as a voting alternate for this case, seconded by J. Plourde. Wade Scott Campbell was present as a non-voting alternate; he could participate in the deliberation but not vote.

- S. Bonczar read the notice of hearing and invited the applicant to come forward and explain what he wanted to do.
- G. Birkett said he was retired this was more of a hobby. He applied for federal firearms license about month before end of the year with ATF (Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives). They will recommend him for approval but he was told to go to town for approval first. Has stuff before the

- 52 police chief. Business would be at residence at 155 Foster Rd. Out in the country. Driveway is long,
- very private. Had hoped this whole thing would be more private. Ultimate goal was to sell to individuals
- 54 who wanted some kind of privacy, rather than a big box store. He could recommend things, go to firing
- range with them, give guidance. Desk in the house for paperwork. A computer. Other than that it was
- 56 storage of firearms. If he was to purchase ahead of time. Didn't want to consign or inventory guns.
- 57 Does have to post specific hours for the ATF in case they want to check his paperwork. Biggest thing for
- 58 FFL was restriction on paperwork on his end. Nothing to do with town all about accuracy of the records
- and traceability of guns. In order to purchase, must fill out 4473 form, sign and complete it correctly.
- Then they allow him to go to NH for handguns or federal for long guns for background. If that fails, they
- are done. If they pass, good to go. After three day delay they can come pick up firearm if they don't
- 62 come back. You don't have to sell anybody a firearm. Wouldn't have to give a reason. He can tell them
- to go elsewhere. Trying to keep it to people he knew. And teach people about firearms. Not a big
- 64 commercial effort. If it were to take off, but he didn't see that happening. Anybody can go to Bass or
- another big box store and buy it at better price than he can meet. People don't want everybody to know
- 66 they have a firearm. He can't tell anyone. May have deliveries once a week or maybe a month. Not like
- picking things up somewhere. No ammunition. This was a Type I license only. No ammunition or black
- powder due to storage problems.
- 69 S. Bonczar asked how many guns on premises except for his own personal.
- G. Birkett said one likely at most at any time. Not trying to put his money forward for inventory. It was
- hard to be competitive. Didn't want to do public. His name would be public as FFL (Federal Firearms
- 72 License) licensee. No sign.
- W. Campbell asked if he would be doing transfers.
- G. Birkett said he could. They buy firearm in Maine and they send to him. They must pass background
- check. If they fail, he would send gun back to that FFL and they would have to get money from that
- dealer. Can import guns under certain restrictions. Say a relative dies in Ireland. Rules allow them to sell
- to him and he could clear through Customs and to him. But must pass background check. If not, it goes
- back to Ireland. He can answer questions and guide them to fill in a 4473. If they lie, they are subject to
- 510,000 fine. That could come back on him. No line on the form asking if they have a protective order
- against them; but as a citizen you must know you have one against you. If you get caught, \$10,000 fine.
- 81 S. Bonczar said it sounded like he had done his homework. He asked if applicant would be the only one
- 82 selling firearms from his home.
- 83 G. Birkett said no one else could do his paperwork or transfer firearms because it is his license.
- J. Plourde asked how people would know about him.
- 85 G. Birkett said the FFL site or by word of mouth. Trying to keep it exclusive, by appointment.
- 86 J. Plourde had found there were already four dealers in Milford. Two businesses and two individuals.
- W. Campbell said that didn't cover FFL 3.
- J. Plourde said none listed in Milford for collectors of curios and relics. At least as of Oct. 2017.
- 89 G. Birkett said there were quite a few. A lot inactive.
- 90 J. Plourde asked, no ammunition?
- 91 G. Birkett said absolutely not.
- 92 J. Plourde asked about black powder, and a safe for the inventory.
- 93 G. Birkett said black power required special license. Did have small safe in for inventory. No long gun
- one. Had locking safe never felt the need. Not required by state law or by federal law. In NH, a whole
- 95 set of rules if you have a loaded handgun in the house where a child comes in. You can keep it loaded but
- subject to a whole set of things. Trigger guards not required. He has them on his handgun. Has to have
- 97 trigger guards for sale. You might want buy trigger guards on line. New guns have them. Used will not.
- Has to give one to new guns.
- W. Campbell asked about security measures.
- G. Birkett said no. Hoped not to have a lot of people coming.
- 101 S. Bonczar asked for questions about the home occupation.
- 102 R. Costantino asked about the property.

- 103 G. Birkett said driving down Foster Rd there were two houses on the left and Mrs. Ferguson's on the
- 104 right. His sits on top. He can see his neighbors. It is 9 acres, so pretty private.
- 105 R. Costantino asked if he spoke to neighbors. Any issues?
- 106 G. Birkett said yes, to both of them. No issues. He also talked to someone not on the list who he thought
- 107 might be interested in coming to him after.
- 108 S. Bonczar – any other questions?

- 109 J. Plourde asked if applicant would be only employee. Reading through an e-mail to Robin (Lunn).
- 110 G. Birkett said yes. Wife can legally if he is out of town and all paperwork filled in and they were
- 111 approved; but in talking to Terry, they don't recommend. Should refer them to another gun dealer in town
- 112 for that paperwork. He was at Bass at counter when someone came in, had a firearm shipped from
- 113 Wisconsin to Bass. Man going to fill out the 4473. He stopped and said he didn't want to and asked the
- 114 young woman with him to. She was about 25; he was about 55. He was trying to tell this young lady
- 115 how to fill it out. He knew this was a straw man purchase. The man found her to buy it for him so he'd
- 116 take the gun and she'd have legal paperwork. The store caught on and shipped the firearm back to
- 117 Wisconsin. The two buyers had figured a big box store would be easier to make that straw man purchase.
- 118 S. Bonczar opened public comment. None. He closed public comment. They would go over special 119 exception criteria to get findings of fact on that.

120 A. Is the proposed use similar to those permitted in the district?

- R. Costantino everything in order.
- J. Plourde agreed. Looking at the case on paper he was initially hesitant, but through ATF research found other dealers in residence areas. All about safety. Felt this applicant came in prepared and provided him with comfort level. Firearms are scary if you didn't know what you were doing. Applicant had shown with application and testimony that he was prepared and knew what he was doing. With FFL guidelines and requirements especially selling of firearms; would be hesitant if he had ammunition on property for sale. Applicant said he won't.
- J. Dargie said if there were 10 or 15 neighbors, or even 2, she would feel differently about it. Personally, wouldn't want it next door. Doesn't like guns. He had done his homework to meet criteria. Far enough from neighbors. She wouldn't even think about it if it was in a dense area. In this circumstance it seemed to work.
- J. Plourde it will be by applicant only.
- J. Dargie no sign, no advertising.

B. Is the specific site an appropriate location for the proposed use?

- J. Dargie it is far enough away, very private
- S. Bonczar using small portion of the house for a desk
- J. Plourde satisfies 25% criteria

C. Will the proposed use adversely affect the adjoining area?

- S. Bonczar no one in and out. No sign
- J. Dargie specific hours seemed very limited

D. Will there be no nuisance or hazard to vehicles or pedestrian?

- J. Dargie same
- J. Plourde talking about 1 or 2 for sale by appointment only. One or two cars at most, and not at the same time.
- S. Bonczar low intensity

E. Will adequate appropriate facilities be provided for the proper operation of the proposed use?

J. Dargie – AFT will make sure that is met – there was other oversight beyond the Board.
